OUR CONTEXT

At Busselton Senior High School, we provide challenging learning opportunities for students to maximise their potential. Through our strong values in respect, empathy, achievement and learning, we prepare our Year 7-12 students for a rapidly changing, and evolving world, in an engaging learning environment. Established in 1958, we have served our community well for over 50 years. Becoming an Independent Public School in 2014, we continue to honour our traditions and close sense of community established and honoured by our staff and students past and present.

We are an inclusive school that caters to the needs of every student by providing flexible pathways and curriculum options. Our ATAR students have consistently achieved high results ensuring direct university entrance. As a Registered Training Organisation, our Vocational Education and Training programs are recognised nationally, enabling students to achieve a Certificate II in Building & Construction, Engineering, Business, Sport & Recreation or Hospitality. Our Specialist Music Program has received acclaim locally, nationally and internationally. The school also offers an extensive range of programs in Visual and Performing Arts, Physical Education, Design and Technology, Computing and Home Economics. We provide a number of enrichment activities such as drama productions, sporting events, international and national excursions, extracurricular programs and other leadership opportunities that enhance the learning students receive at BSHS.

We provide a safe, supportive and inclusive learning environment by developing positive relationships with our students and ensuring they feel safe and valued during their secondary schooling. Our comprehensive pastoral care structure sees a committed team of staff focus on the wellbeing of your child, including three Associate Principals, three Year Coordinators, a School Psychologist, Nurse, Attendance Officer and Student Services Support Officer. As a Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) school, our students are taught the values of Respect, Empathy, Achieve and Learning (REAL), which are reinforced by the school community through the REAL award program.

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YEAR 10 – 12 REVIEW

Summary 2018

- Attainment Rate (Graph 1): 100% and the third straight year it has been above 90%. BSHS was the only School in the Southwest Region to achieve 100%.
- VET Achievement (Graph 2): 100% VET completion for the second straight year.
- Median ATAR (Graph 3): 78.9%, was the highest in the Busselton region and well above Like Schools.
- WACE Achievement (Graph 4): 95% Graduation rate compared with 81% Like and 89% State Public Schools.
- ATAR Expected Performance: Between 2015 & 2018, BSHS's predicted school median has consistently remained within 0.7 standard deviations (SD) either negative or positive and in 2018, it was 1.38 SD above expected performance.

- Continue with the early identification of Senior School Students at risk and ensure appropriate monitoring and matching of interventions.

- Introduce the Lower School HomeWork Lunch intervention into Senior School.
- Streamline data analysis practices and strengthen the alignment with the Learning Area Plan.
- Continue with the external sourced ATAR
 Revision Program during School Holidays.
- Engage in local partnerships to offer more scope of choice for certificate courses.
- Pilot a Year 10 Engagement and Transition Program in collaboration with Cape Naturaliste College and Southwest Regional Education Office.

YEAR 7 – 9 REVIEW

Summary 2018

Year 9 NAPLAN Longitudinal Summary

2016-2018 (Graph 5): Demonstrates a consistent trend and in 2018 our student performance was above like schools in Writing, Numeracy, Reading, Grammar and Punctuation. Spelling was slightly below like schools.

- Year 7 NAPLAN Summary: Year 7 student performance was above like schools in Writing, Numeracy, Reading, Grammar and Punctuation. Spelling was one NAPLAN score below like schools.
- NAPLAN Student Progress and Achievement

(Graph 6): All aspects of NAPLAN except for Numeracy were in the top right-hand guadrant demonstrating Higher Achievement and Progress when compared to 'Like Schools'. Numeracy demonstrated higher achievement. This analysis confirms that we value added to our stable cohort from 2016-2018.

• Year 6 to 7 Transition Program: A formalised successful transition program is now embedded with our local primary schools. This is evident by over 95% of students stating in the recent student survey data that they felt safe and happy at BSHS.

Recommendations 2019

- Resume the development of our Academic Multi-tiered System of Supports (Diagram 7).
- Continue to review and refine the following systems:
 - Academic Enrichment
 - Kick-Start
 - HomeWork Lunch
 - Food for Thought
 - Waalitj Kartajin
- Investigate Lower School Engagement options and resource appropriately.
- Introduce Bright-path Assessment Software to Year 7 and 8 as a trial school.
- Investigate Inquiry and Project-Based Learning Approaches possibly linked to the Big Picture Philosophy.
- Develop a more formalised 'cluster' approach with our local primary schools.
- Introduce the PLC Steering Team developed 'Effort Rubric' and align to the PBS matrix.
- Refocus the PLC Steering team with a common purpose to support whole school cross-collaboration with all Learning Areas.

ACADEMIC: PROFESSIONAL LEARNING **COMMUNITIES (PLC)**

LEARNING ENVIRONMENT, TEACHING AND LEARNING

Summary 2018

- Attendance Categories (Graph 7): Regular attendance was 59% (percentage of students who attend 90% or more). This was an improvement of 1% from the previous year and 2.1% above Like Schools. However, this was slightly below our school target of above 60%.
- Positive Behaviour Support (PBS): Benchmarks of Quality (Graph 8): PBS continues to be our cornerstone strategy for ensuring a productive Learning Environment.

An external review was undertaken utilising the Benchmark of Quality. BSHS overall quality was 91%. While outstanding, improvement is required in the areas of Data Entry and Analysis, Staff Commitment and Encouragement System.

Report Data REAL Expectations (Graph 9):

In 2018 BSHS undertook a review into our external communication and reporting guidelines. It was decided to develop guidelines concerning the grading of our REAL Expectations (ABE) and processes to monitor the subsequent data more explicitly. It is evident that the consistency of students exhibiting our expectations in the classroom decreased between Semester 1 and 2 Reports.

- Teaching and Learning: BSHS was successfully involved in PhD Study entitled 'Effective Classroom Management Strategies' at supporting staff through targeted Professional Learning and feedback.
- **Communication at BSHS:** Qualitative feedback from staff and community has indicated that the school needs to improve its communication systems to better meet the needs of our key stakeholders.

Recommendations 2019

• Continue the implementation of PBS:

- Tier 2 Development focus
- Review of reward structures
- Integrate a Mental focus for students
- Monitor REAL Expectation Reporting data implement strategies to decrease the decline in Semester 2.
- Review of the REAL Matrix.
- Refine student leadership structures by increasing 'Student Voice' and appointment of Student Leadership Coordinator.
- Engage an external company to audit BSHS's student, staff and community culture to ensure our culture continues to improve.
- Formalise the Waalitj Kartajin Program into our own Academy and align with the Aboriginal Cultural Standards Framework.
- Implement the new reporting guidelines collaboratively developed by the school.
- Reinvigorate our Pedagogical Framework to inform practice and Professional Development.
- Implement engagement strategies linked to Purpose, Engage, R.E.A.L, Feedback, Opportunities, Reflect and Mastery (PERFORM).
- Investigate integrating lessons learnt from the 'Effective Classroom Management Strategies' Study into our PERFORM Classroom Observations.
- Collaboratively develop a new internal communication system to empower teachers with the information they need in a way that makes their lives easier and inspires good communication.
